The cast of Agatha Christie's play, 'Black Coffee', are working hard in rehearsals, preparing for their performance in November.


## **Bio-Bake Competition**


Congratulations to all the pupils who took up the challenge to create a cake representing the science of how a body works. And the winners were......




Year 6 enjoyed their Science lesson in the sunshine by making human ray diagrams.


## #iloveboarding

## Cavendish Laboratory, Cambridge University



On 20th September 2023, fifteen pupils from Year 11 visited the Cavendish Science Laboratory at Cambridge University. Throughout the day we had a variety of talks from PHD students, apprenticeship students and Professors. Each talk gave us a great insight into the Physics courses Cambridge has to offer as well as other stem subjects that benefit from Physics knowledge. In our first talk we learnt about student apprenticeships at Cambridge University, which you can start at 16 years of age. In another talk we learnt about superconductors and how they can benefit the world in the future. We also learnt about how using different frequencies could make communications faster in many

industries. We had the opportunity to interact with robots to develop their understanding of human interactions and responses. And lastly, we had a demonstration from the company Mathworks based at Cambridge University, on how many NASA projects including the Mars rover are simulated before they are made into the final prototypes. Overall, we all found the trip very interesting and inspiring. We would like to say a huge thank you to Mrs Daws for organising and taking us on the trip and to Cambridge University for having us and giving up their time to talk to us.
