## Remembrance Service



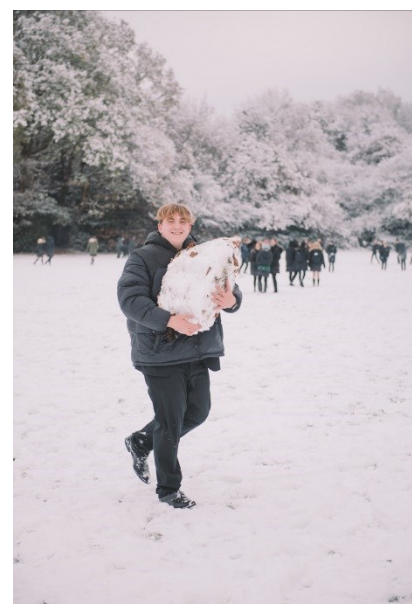
The whole School came together on Friday 11th November to mark the special occasion of Remembrance Day.

## Year 6 Girls Football

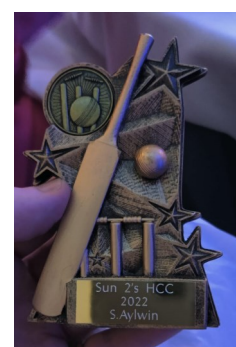


Well done to our Year 6 Girls Football squad who participated in the U11 Bromley High School Football Tournament! A really exhilarating event!

## Designer Musical Instruments



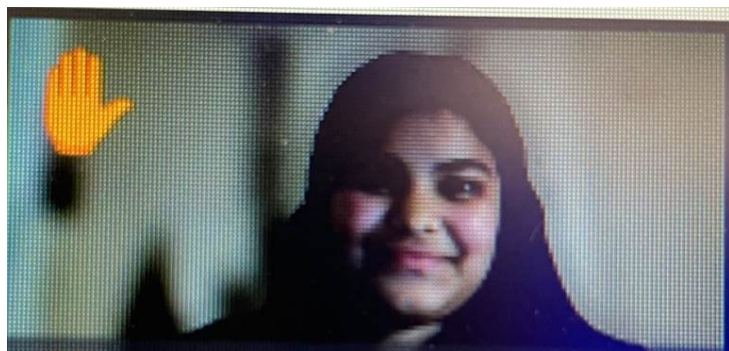

## Sixth Form Public Speaking



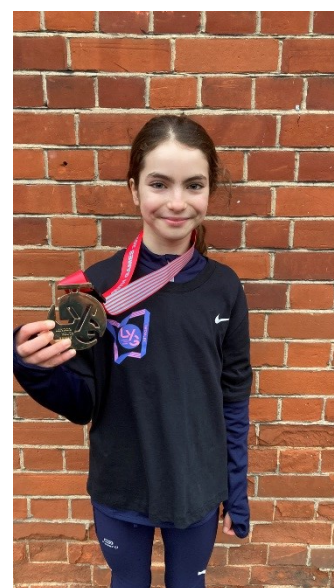

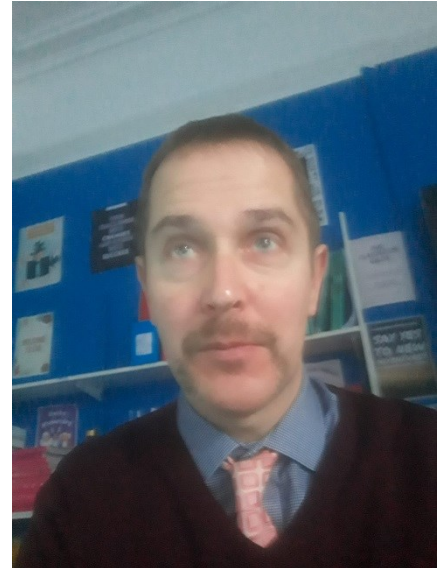

## British Film Institute

On the 1<sup>st</sup> of December we went to the BFI at Southbank. It was great to go into London for the day and have the experience of a film day at the BFI with other French A Level students. We learnt about different types of cinema and specifically the impact of French cinema on global cinema and vice versa. We particularly focused on new wave cinema and learnt about the beginning of more realistic and naturalistic acting as well as the new types of filming such as hand held camera giving the impression of a documentary style film. We did this through examining certain cult classic French cinema and important scenes from those films such as Amelie, in which colours are a focus of the film to represent a fairy-tale like world as well as filming in Mont Martre to give a sense of idealistic old Paris. We finished the experience by watching a film called 'Entre les murs' which was filmed to imitate a documentary and used non actors to portray the role to give a sense of realism. It was a great day and we learnt a lot about the importance of French cinema in French society and the world as well as being able to listen to other French speakers.

# The Land of Ice and Fire



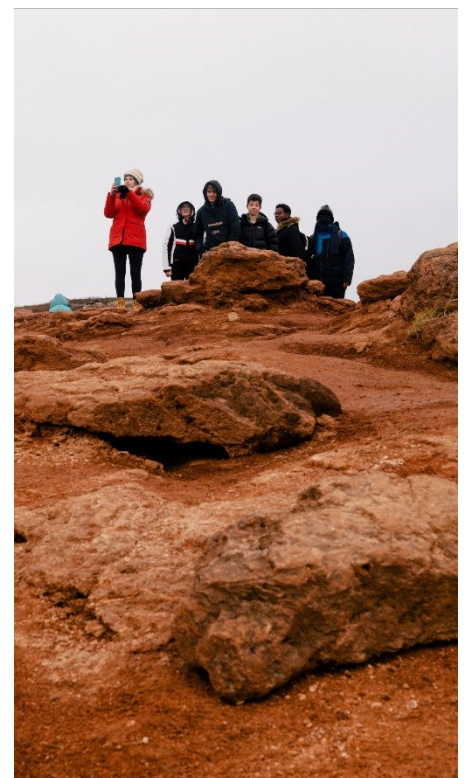
The 2022 Farringtons school adventure to Iceland was a tremendous success. The students and staff alike had a great trip and one they will no doubt remember for a long time. The trip provided an opportunity to swim in the Blue Lagoon, walk behind, right up to and above some major waterfalls, nothing like what we have on offer in the UK. We witnessed the eruption of the world famous Geyser and even managed to visit the lava fields from the 2021 Fagradalsfjall Volcano on the Reykjanes Peninsula.

We also saw first hand the power of the earth at the geothermal power plant and saw the necessity to use this type of power to save humanity from the extremes of climate change upon visiting the Sólheimajökul Glacier. Over my 17 years of experiencing this country on several occasions I have personally witnessed the ablation of glacial ice here.

We were incredibly lucky to see the Northern Lights directly above the hotel on one evening and with an array of budding photographers and filmography enthusiasts on board we have captured this and many other moments for life.

We ended the tour with my traditional awards ceremony where we highlight and praise all the other fun events that happened that don't exactly fit into any category of the Geography textbook.

An excellent trip all round and one that I am certain will be talked about for many years to come.

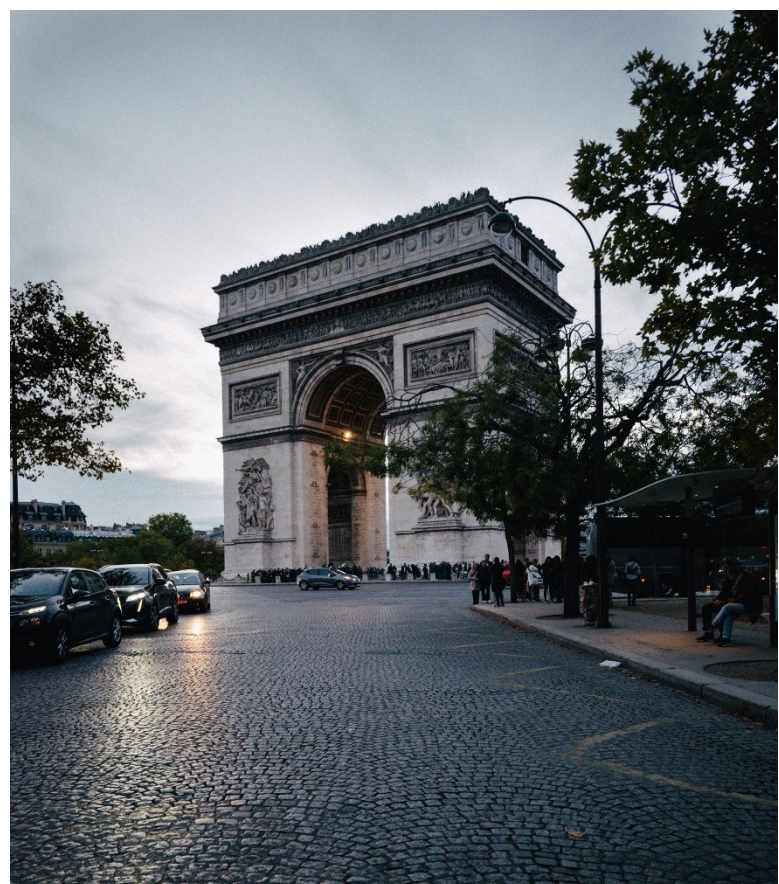

The first place we went to was 'La Tour Montparnasse' which was a 210-metre-tall tower where we could see all of Paris, all the straight streets, the Eiffel Tower and even the fire damaged Notre Dame.

The next day was by far the day with the most walking. After an early breakfast we hopped on the metro and visited the Eiffel Tower, the Louvre (and saw the Mona Lisa!), a Photography Museum and trekked up the Champs-Élysées to take pictures near the Arc de Triomphe.

Our third day kicked off with a 3D experience showing all the hidden gems of the city and then visiting the Centre Pompidou where they had hung a painting upside down for more than 70 years! We then embarked on a long walk to the Paris Latin Quarter where nearly all of us had kebabs in the many tiny shops there. After lunch, we were booked to go for a cruise on a 'Bateau Mouche' on the Seine where the extremely knowledgeable guide pointed out all the historic sights. We then chose to go for a night-time viewing of La Tour Eiffel and we were lucky enough to catch the gorgeous twinkling lights and take lots of pictures!

Our final day in Paris was bittersweet and the weather certainly reflected our feelings. The rainy day in high-altitude Montmartre meant that we were soaked through, but I think I can say for all of us that despite this, the view from up there was worth it! All those steps with our heavy bags however meant that it was a strenuous climb. The way back to London gave us an opportunity to rest and discuss our plans for the rest of the half term, and of course share the thousands of photos that we had taken!
