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Farringtons School Prevent Duty Policy

1. Introduction

- 1.1 From 1 July 2015 all schools must have regard to the statutory guidance. registered early years childcare providers and registered later years childcare providers (referred to in this advice as 'childcare providers') are subject to a duty under section 26 of the Counter-Terrorism and Security Act 2015, in the exercise of their functions, to have "due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism". This duty is known as the Prevent duty.
- 1.2 This advice complements the statutory guidance and refers to other relevant guidance and advice. It is intended to help staff within Farringtons School to think about what they can do to protect children from the risk of radicalisation and suggests how they can access support to do this. It reflects actions that Farringtons School is already taking to protect children from this risk.
- 1.3 This Policy should be read in conjunction with the school's Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy and British Values Policy.

2 The Prevent Duty: What does it mean for Farringtons school

- 2.1 In order for Farringtons School to fulfil the Prevent Duty, it is essential that staff are able to identify children who may be vulnerable to radicalisation, and know what to do when they are identified. Protecting children from the risk of radicalisation is part of the child protection and safeguarding duties, and should be treated in a similar nature to protecting children from other harms (e.g. drugs, gangs, neglect, sexual exploitation), whether these come from within their family or are the product of outside influences.
- 2.2 Farringtons School looks to build pupils' resilience to radicalisation by promoting fundamental British Values (See *British Values Policy* and *PSHE Policy*) and enabling them to challenge extremist views.
- 2.3 It is important to emphasise that the Prevent duty is not intended to stop pupils debating controversial issues. On the contrary, Farringtons School will provide a safe space in which children, young people and staff can understand the risks associated with terrorism and develop the knowledge and skills to be able to challenge extremist arguments.
- 2.4 The statutory framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage sets standards for learning, development and care for children from 0-5, thereby assisting their personal, social and emotional development and understanding of the world.
- 2.5 The statutory guidance on the Prevent Duty summarises the requirements on schools and childcare providers in terms of four general themes: **risk assessment, working in partnership, staff training** and **IT policies**. This policy focuses on those four themes.

3 Risk assessment

- 3.1 The statutory guidance makes clear that schools and childcare providers are expected to assess the risk of children being drawn into terrorism, including

support for extremist ideas that are part of terrorist ideology. This means being able to demonstrate both a general understanding of the risks affecting children and young people in the area and a specific understanding of how to identify individual children who may be at risk of radicalisation and what to do to support them.

- 3.2 Farringtons School acknowledges that general risks affecting children and young people may vary from area to area, and according to their age. Farringtons School will undertake a risk assessment (Appendix 1) to identify risks within a given local context. It is important that these risks are understood so that staff can respond in an appropriate and proportionate way.
- 3.3 Farringtons School understands the increased risk of online radicalisation, as terrorist organisations seek to radicalise young people through the use of social media and the internet. The Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) will work closely with the local authorities and seek advice from local police with regards to the contextual information to help understand the risks in the local area. The school *Online-Safety Policy* and *On-line-Safety Monitoring Policy* helps to protect and monitor pupils and staff access to the internet.
- 3.4 Farringtons School acknowledges that there is no single way of identifying an individual who is likely to be susceptible to a terrorist ideology. As with managing other safeguarding risks, staff should be alert to changes in children's behaviour which could indicate that they may be in need of help or protection. Children at risk of radicalisation may display different signs or seek to hide their views. Farringtons School staff should use their professional judgement in identifying children who might be at risk of radicalisation and refer them to the DSL.
- 3.5 Farringtons School notes that even very young children may be vulnerable to radicalisation by others, whether in the family or outside, and display concerning behaviour. The Prevent Duty does not require teachers to carry out unnecessary intrusion into family life but as with any other safeguarding risk, they must take action when they observe behaviour of concern (See *Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy*).

4 Working in Partnership

- 4.1 Farringtons School through its Prevent Duty Policy builds on existing local partnership arrangements. Local Children's Services are responsible for co-ordinating what is done by local agencies for the purposes of safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children in their local area. Safeguarding arrangements already take into account the policies and procedures of the relevant Children's Services
- 4.2 Farringtons School understands that Local authorities are vital to all aspects of Prevent work.
- 4.3 Farringtons School understands that there is a need for effective engagement with parents as the family is also important as they are in a key position to spot signs of radicalisation. The Designated Safeguarding Lead will assist and advise families who raise concerns and be able to point them to the right support mechanisms.

5 Staff training

- 5.1 The Designated Safeguarding Lead briefs staff annually through the Child Protection and Safeguarding training on understanding what is involved in the Prevent Duty and how the Channel programme works. Key staff within the school have completed the Government *online general awareness training module on Channel*.

6 IT Policies

- 6.1 The statutory guidance makes clear the need for schools to ensure that children are safe from terrorist and extremist material when accessing the internet in schools. As per KCSIE 2023 Farringtons School ensures that suitable filtering and monitoring is in place, a weekly report of suspicious searches is sent to the Designated Safeguarding Lead (See *Online Safety Policy*).
- 6.2 Farringtons School understands that it has an important role to play in equipping children and young people to stay safe online, both in school and outside. Internet safety is an integral part of the school's ICT curriculum and is also embedded in the RE & PSHE curriculum.

7 Building children's resilience to radicalisation

- 7.1 As explained within this Policy, Farringtons School builds pupils' resilience to radicalisation by providing a safe environment for debating controversial issues and helping them to understand how they can influence and participate in decision-making. Farringtons School also promotes the spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of pupils through the wellbeing curriculum and through its promotion of British Values (See *PHSE Policy* and *British Values Policy*)

8 What to do if you have a concern

- 8.1 If a member of staff is concerned about a particular child they should follow the School's Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy including recording on MyConcern
- 8.2 Staff can also contact the local police force or dial 101 (the non-emergency number). They can talk to you in confidence about your concerns and help you gain access to support and advice.

- 8.5 Please note that the helpline is not intended for use in emergency situations, such as a child being at immediate risk of harm or a security incident, in which case the normal emergency procedures should be followed.
- 8.6 Staff are reminded that with radicalisation concerns, when there are reasonable

grounds to believe that a child is at risk of significant harm, parental consent is not necessarily required to make a referral.
